One of the questions I get almost daily is, what is going on with inflation? How can our government create so much money, debt and deficits out of thin air and not have some type of recourse on the value of our money? My guess is it will not last forever.

Most every economist I've spoken to is expecting inflation to return to some areas of the market and most expect it will last for 5 to 10 years.

A CEO of a corporation I know, recently gave a presentation to a small group of 35 big fund managers. The main question they all asked him was, "How will your company do during hyperinflation?" It's an interesting question. He felt this was one of the major things on their mind. My guess is they too are expecting a return of inflation.

You should all get used to the fact that the purchasing power of your dollar will be less than it was before. Although with so many things going down in price such as stocks, oil, real estate etc... it becomes harder to see the depreciation happening. Most markets don't react very quickly and most of the time we don't see the effects of our government's actions for a 18 to 24 month period.

One thing that has been going up is gold prices. The yellow metal has been on a run and trading well beyond the past 1980 high of \$850.

Gold is priced in dollars and has been trading between the \$730 - \$950 range in the past 18 months. I talk to quite a few people about this sudden surge and everyone is wondering if it will hold above the \$900 mark or surpass \$1000 again.

I don't know if anyone realizes that gold is in a major bull market worldwide and that it is at all time highs against several other currencies including the New Zealand Dollar, British Pound, Russian Ruble, Euros, Australian Dollar, and the Canadian Dollar!

Gold is currently up 34% from its October lows and has broken out upside from its head and shoulders bottom. Gold is up against almost everything else which includes stocks, currencies, commodities, and even bonds. The DJIA is down 79% in terms of gold over the last decade.

Now President Obama is walking into a mess that I cannot imagine anyone wanting. He is by far the most popular candidate I have ever seen. The second most popular was George Bush during his second term re-election. Everybody seemed to love him (except most of Hollywood.) I wonder how President Obama will look after a few years in office. My guess is, he too will grow some gray hair.

I've stated here for some time that the Fed will pump all the money needed to offset any slowing we might see in the economy. Well, we're starting to see it. I imagine the slowing down of our economy will get worse along with unemployment rates. How much spending will they do in order to offset a major fall? How much liquidity will they have to create in order to offset it? I can't figure out how they will possibly do it and I don't enjoy the fact that I'm not smart enough to figure out this high finance mumbo jumbo. It doesn't sound easy.

I have read several articles on the FDR days about the time

when we put everyone to work building up military supplies for the war effort. We very well may see another type of great employment attempt by our government to get the masses back to work. I get the feeling that anything we do, will become very inflationary.

Ok so how are we doing in the coin arena ? Very well, I would say. The market for good coins is very strong, but once again, the supply of new coins on the market is very thin.

I have only purchased back one big coin deal from a client in the last 5 months. The client inherited the coins, and needed to sell some in order to buy a race car and a new boat.

Sounds like a great idea...

Inherit something tangible that is an appreciating asset that should show large increases over the next decade, but instead sell it to buy a depreciating asset. Alas, he doesn't understand the rare coin market but his father certainly did.



The **gold coin market** has softened in the more generic gold coins. This is due to a lack of demand by investors. The rarer date coins are still very hot and proof gold continues to be in high demand and is getting harder to buy. Early gold coins (prior to 1838) seem to become available only one coin at a time and I'm usually able to acquire at least one of these once every quarter.

The **19th Century Type** coin market is very strong, but prices have not really taken off. This is a very advantages time to step into this market. Some of the coins are very inexpensive based upon their rarity. A great example is the underpriced 2 cent pieces that were first struck during the Civil War. These were the first US coins to have the motto, "In God We Trust" on them. An original Red example in the grade of MS 65 is currently priced in the \$1700 range. Other areas that have been overlooked are old Half Dimes (both Bust examples and Liberty Seated examples) as well as all the Nickel coins such as 3 Cent Nickels, Liberty Nickels, and Shield Nickels.

There are some fantastic **Proof Morgan Dollars** listed in this issue that I purchased back from the client I spoke of earlier. These are great coins, very collectible, everyone of them rare in high grades, and some of my all time favorites.

Silver Commemoratives are very, very underpriced.

There's not much more I can say. These are great coins at very cheap price levels. Some of the commems are trading at 10 to 15 cents on the dollar of their past highs from 19 years ago. The Silver Commemorative coins are an area everyone should be placing into their investment funds. There is an article about Silver Commemoratives written by David, on our homepage www.davidhall.com if you would like to know more.

The **Modern Singles** area is very strong for the rarer dates. The common dates for these: Buffalo Nickels, Mercury Dimes, and Walking Liberty Half Dollars are very good values.

The **Silver Dollar** market is in a similar place. While the rarer dates remain strong, the common dates continue to remain very low in value. A great example is the common date Morgan Dollars, currently priced around \$160 a coin. In 1980 these were selling for \$80, and by 1986 they were selling in the \$850 to \$900 range! The prices corrected back to the \$125 range and now with silver bullion going to over \$12, these coins are now only priced at a mere \$160. Amazingly, silver has tripled in price and these coins still remain under \$200. The MS 66 Morgans continue to be a great value and I've been buying them for both my children.

The rare coin market certainly looks to be primed to take off for the next several years. Spend some time looking over the coins inside this issue. I did not include some of the descriptions as to a late deadline. Please give me a call if you have any questions on any of the coins.
